This course will introduce students to the religious plurality in South Asia by identifying processes through which religious identities and boundaries are defined in history, particularly in terms of "self" and "others," and in relation to social, political and economic factors. At the center of this examination is the complex cluster of traditions and groups that are conventionally called Hinduism, focusing mainly on developments in the early modern and modern periods (roughly 1500 to the present) that helped to shape the definition of Hinduism that we see today. By observing historical instances of Hindus encountering, incorporating, rejecting, and defining many kinds of "others" (and, in the process, Hindus themselves) this course offers a historically nuanced and theoretically critical re-introduction to the history of religions in modern India. Among the questions that we will deal with in the course are: who is involved in establishing religious identities and boundaries, what resources do they use, and to what authorities do they appeal? How were religious identity, difference, indifference, toleration, and antagonism understood and expressed in the past? What is at stake in identifying individuals and communities in terms of religion? To what extent do our modern, Euro-American conceptions of religion inform and obscure a view of history in India?

3. Course Design:

The transformation of the Indian economy since the economic reforms starting in 1991 is one of the major storylines of the last two decades. But while everyone is interested in the story, its content is hotly debated, especially within India. All agree that the economy is growing rapidly, but that's where the consensus ends. Critics of India's reforms have numerous complaints: poverty reduction has been slow; malnutrition and illiteracy are still rampant; dalits (formerly known as "untouchables"), tribals and other under-privileged groups are losing out; in some dimensions the status of girls/women is deteriorating. Indian growth also has a long way to go; per capita income is still very low. Some question the environmental sustainability of the growth process, and others argue that growth will not continue unless it becomes more inclusive. Others take a far more optimistic view. A slew of recent books have titles like: "India: The Emerging Giant" and "Propelling India." From this perspective, the problem is that economic reforms have not gone far enough: markets should be allowed to operate more freely, and state intervention in the economy must be further reduced.

This course will introduce you to alternative perspectives from which growth and economic reforms are being viewed. The fun as well as the challenge of this task is that India is a diverse country in various dimensions -- religion, history, geography -- and is socially stratified in complicated ways. Note that you will need some of the standard skills of an economist, especially econometrics. You will also need to learn something about Indian society. I will help you with both.

We begin by reviewing India's development strategy since independence. The next section introduces you to alternative perspectives, as well as a surprisingly acrimonious debate about statistical trends in poverty. We will then turn to arguments about what to do next. The first set of topics addresses the reform process itself: the impact of trade liberalization, the need to make labor markets "flexible," the role of subsidized credit. The second set of debates pertains to the policies necessary to address long-standing social inequalities: by caste, wealth, and gender. Many argue that market forces will not, by themselves, address these problems--the state has to intervene pro-actively. The third (brief) section will consider the impact of electoral politics on governance.

This course was motivated by one central question: Why are we hearing such different narratives of economic development in India? We will try to think not only about which narrative is "right," but also about how things look depending on where you are located. Therefore, this course is part of the college's Exploring Diversity Initiative.

Course Requirements

Course is rated with 6 credits (for CeMIS students). Note that the details of the final exam will be provided in the introductory lecture session. The details of the possible grading for seminars and papers will also be discussed in the introductory lecture. Based on the feedback from all the

students we will decide whether to grade seminars and papers for the course and also design of the final exam. The course requires you to:

(a) Present papers which I will present before in hand for the next tutorial sessions. These presentations are split among students and are spread across the tutorial sessions. I expect you to have read them and come prepared for presentation. I will call on you (other than the presenter) to participate in the discussion; you should not view this as violation of your human rights !

(b) You are also expected to write two short essays (6 pages, approximately). You should plan about the topics for writing these essays in prior consultation with me.

Note:

i. Most of the papers to be discussed in the course have empirical focus. Thus, the course requires solid understanding of how to read and interpret statistics.

3. This one-day workshop aims to help German students to become more capable and comfortable in working with academic English -- both in their reading and their writing. Goal #1 is to familiarize students methodically and critically to the major aspects of how English academic writing is structured and composed. Thus the first half of the workshop will consist of a lecture by the workshop leader with a Powerpoint presentation, followed by observing several examples of outstanding English academic essays and ample time for answering students' questions. With an awareness of how English essays are structured, students will be able to read their academic English assignments more strategically and effectively. Goal #2 involves applying this structural knowledge to students' own planning, researching, and composing of English essays for their courses with CeMIS faculty. Thus, after a break for lunch, we will reconvene for a lecture that focuses on common difficulties that students have when starting to write research essays. This includes giving special attention to problems that German students especially encounter with English composition (conceptual, structural, and grammatical), and offering practical recommendations for how to avoid and overcome those problems. After another round of questions/answers and a short break, the workshop will conclude with a Powerpoint lecture on technology (non-digital as well as freeware and commercial software) that students may use to help them in their essay writing. Students will again have the opportunity to ask questions about the day's lectures and about writing in general. The workshop presenter will also be available during the semester to meet with interested students who seek help with their English composition and reading skills.
The workshop will occur from on Saturday, 3 November from 10:00 until 15:00, including a one-hour break for lunch. The workshop organizer also will be available throughout the semester to work with students individually on their writing assignments as desired.
